

Christ Church Cathedral School

Dear Parents.

Early June is always a time of mixed emotion for me. This week our Form 8s have taken their Common Entrance exams, the exams which mark the end of their time at the School. In some cases the boys have been here since Nursery which means they have been pupils at CCCS for over a decade. At the age of 13, that is a very considerable proportion of their lives. Leaving CCCS is therefore a really significant occasion. No teacher, I suspect, can ever fully reconcile themselves to the fact that the children they have got to know so well are ready to move on, despite the fact that this is what the School is set up to achieve. When the children arrive in Nursery they cannot read or write, most have a fairly limited vocabulary but looking at the boys taking their exams on Tuesday, I was struck by how many high level skills they had mastered. There can be no period of life where the changes are so significant and it is a privilege to be involved with such a profoundly important period in a person's life.

We are very proud of these senior boys – so often at Open Mornings it is our pupils, who undertake the tours, whom the parents remark upon and I'm not surprised. We have adopted the tradition of displaying photos of the boys in the Dining Hall for one year after they have left us. The boys decide how they want to be remembered, whether that be with a reading book, nursing a Rugby Ball or playing a trumpet with the panache of a modern day Louis Armstrong. I always think that these pictures say a great deal both about the boys and about the School. For me they focus on our leavers as individuals – there is no typical Christ Church boy; our boys are allowed to be themselves and the School has a wonderful way of letting them flourish and nurturing their talents, something which the photos make very clear.

Another aspect of the photos which struck me when I was looking at them recently, was the way in which they remind us of the number of different schools that our boys go on to after they leave us. Of course, the central mission of a Prep school is to prepare boys for their senior schools. And this is a task which we take very seriously indeed. I believe that there is no overall best school, but I do believe there is a best school for any one individual and our role, working with parents, is to identify what that school is and to prepare our boys to get into that school. We work hard to have relationships with all our many destination schools and an important part of my job is to get to know the Heads and Registrars of those schools so that I can ensure that boys go to the right school.

It is always a pleasure therefore, to welcome senior school staff to preach at Cathedral Assembly and we were fortunate to have Paul Smith, Registrar at Eton, speak to us this morning. He spoke movingly about the Prodigal Son setting up a fruitful dialogue with the boys who were desperate to answer his questions. He asked some boys to hand out a beautiful and touching painting by Rembrandt of the Prodigal Son. It was a work painted towards the very end of Rembrandt's life and shows an old man with his hands gently touching the back of his returning son. The quiet intensity of the emotion displayed in the painting is deeply moving and ensures that this is one of the greatest of the master's works. Mr Smith, having already realised the erudition of his listeners, asked who they thought had painted it. A voice responded, sounding clearly round the Cathedral, "Was it you?" Someone has learnt already how to ensure that he makes friends!

I enjoyed watching our Colts A and B playing against New College on Wednesday. I was delighted that we managed to win in both games. Such an achievement was predicted by one of the New College boys. He spotted one of our boys who used to be at New College who was playing in the Bs. "Oh no." he said, "If he's in their Bs rather than their As, we're all dead!" The result wasn't quite as drastic for New College as the boy had predicted, but, fortunately for us, he wasn't far wrong!

Just before half term, the Cathedral Choir travelled to Sweden for a Concert Tour. Our first stop was in Stockholm where the boys sang an afternoon concert at the Cathedral. Whilst in Stockholm the boys enjoyed very much staying in a boat hotel, which was moored on a lake at the edge of the historic 'old town'. The following day saw a trip to the Museum of Modern Art and an evening boat trip, where the boys performed again.

Upsalla is a beautiful University Town which boasts the largest Cathedral in Sweden. There is an interesting quirk of firing a cannon every time a Doctor graduates from the university. Our tour of the university coincided with the graduation of several dozen Doctoral Students which made for a very spectacular (if noisy) event. The boys sang both an evening concert and High Mass before departing for our final destination - Rattvik.

Rattvik has an amazing and quite unexpected American Diner in the centre of the town which was a particular favourite of the boys. 

We earned a convincing 20 run victory by the end of 20 overs.

Our Colts A team lost the toss and fielded first. Some exceptional bowling upfront meant that we could rotate the bowling more than we normally would with proper cricket.
