Dear Parents,

The dreadful events in Ukraine continue to horrify; indeed, very sadly, things seem to get worse before our eyes. I am very grateful to everyone who brought in money and supplies. As may be seen elsewhere in the Newsletter, the money has been used to make food in our kitchens and I would like to thank our wonderful kitchen staff for taking the time to make the large number of meals. How extraordinary that meals are being prepared here, in our kitchens on Brewer St, and that they will be eaten in Eastern Europe in the very near future. In the case of the supplies, they have already arrived at a depot from where they will be taken to Ukraine. Mr Dickinson has asked the boys to come up with a way of collecting money, just in the same way that we undertook the 'Jerusalema' dance, when we raised money for Oxygen to India last year. Mr Dickinson has also said that he is prepared to dye his hair a lurid colour if that helps to raise money - I want to thank him for agreeing to allow his hair to be 'transformed' on behalf of Ukraine.

In the Cathedral today we were fortunate to hear from Dr Richard Kowenicki, the academic Deputy from Shrewsbury School in Shropshire. He spoke to the boys about the discovery of Ernest Shackleton's ship, the Endeavour, found this week miles below the Antarctic Ocean where it fell, intact, after more than 100 years, despite its being constructed entirely from wood. Dr Kowenicki talked about the way in which one of the explorers, Tom Crehan, helmed the lifeboat all 800 miles to the nearest inhabited place, South Georgia, in order for them to send another ship to rescue the other men. Despite his bravery and commitment, Tom never sought the limelight and his heroism is largely forgotten. Dr Kowenicki reminded us of the importance of those people who do good things quietly, without reward or glorification.

I was so delighted to attend the final Pembroke evensong of the term in chapel last week. The choir has moved on hugely since the beginning of term and the boys are clearly enjoying themselves. The chapel at Pembroke is a jewel box of colour, ravishing in its reddish hues. It struck me, with the front row completely taken up by our boys and many of the pews taken up by the parents, how transformational the experience is for Pembroke in having our boys. They could not have been more welcoming to us.

There have been a great number of people who have been rather disappointed by the fact that I am no longer clad in an orange wig with an owl attached to my hand, as I was last Thursday for World Book Day. One parent asked if we could adopt it as our uniform! I have to say that I feel rather pedestrian, this week, coming into school wearing a conventional suit! Fortunately we have the Easter Party which we are going to hold on the last day of term, as a replacement to the Punch Party. Preparations are already being made; we will be raising money for the Pavilion but it is also a lovely opportunity to meet together as a family. It will be the first of a number of events that we can enjoy this year, including a private trip to the Upper Library and an end of year Summer Ball to be held in the Great Hall. I very much hope as many of you as possible will join us for those. Details will follow imminently.




