

# Christ Church Cathedral School

#### Dear Parents,

Those of us who were lucky enough to be in the Upper Library last Friday were given an extraordinary treat. The room was looking resplendent in the sunshine, its airy spaces illuminated by the early evening light. The walls of old leather tomes, tanned with the ages, lent a deep patina to the room which must have struck everyone present. The librarians had laid out some incomparable treasures. In pride of place was a book of biblical passages commissioned by Cardinal Wolsey. As with everything he did, he spared no expense. The volume was made from vellum, effectively animal skin - indeed each double page was made from an entire animal. Just to show how much had been spent on the book, only a small amount of writing had been put on each page. The illustrations were truly sumptuous. The colours were dazzlingly vibrant as if they had only been painted that very morning. On every page, the Cardinal's coat of arms had been painstakingly painted. There were other treasures too. We were the first group ever to have been shown a copy of the first bible ever printed in America which had been published in Boston in the Mid 17th Century. There was a visitors' book form the Deanery at the time of Henry Liddell and in it the very clear signature of his famous daughter Alice. I also saw a 1st edition of Copernicus's book where he outlines his revolutionary theory that the earth went around the sun. The book was open at the page where he had drawn a little diagram of the sun surrounded by the planets. We were looking, therefore, at the very first reliable illustration of the solar system. Here at Christ Church we are so lucky to have access to such extraordinary treasures.

As you will have seen from the posters around the City, we have held two very successful Open Days recently, one last Saturday when we held a Chorister Afternoon and one Stay & Play on Wednesday. In both cases there were good numbers of people and both events were thoroughly enjoyed by all concerned. The visiting boys at Chorister Afternoon loved being in the colourful environment in which they found themselves and were delighted to sit in the Great Hall, at what they decided was the Gryffindor Table. At the Stay & Play, the young pupils were sent on a Bear Hunt around the Nursery garden, searching high and low for carefully hidden bears. Both events were attended by some of our older pupils who sung with the potential choristers and helped play with the bear hunters. In both cases the parents remarked on how helpful and charming our boys had been. We are so fortunate in our senior pupils and though I love this time of year greatly, it is always somewhat clouded by the fact that we lose our Form 8s. Having said that, it is always a matter of pride to see these charming young men heading off into the world to attend their senior schools.

At this time of year, the cow parsley is at its most verdant. The Woodland School really is a picture, so very different from the way it looks in the autumn. Mown paths wind their way through the cow parsley and under the canopy of leaves – it is a wonderful place for the children to be. We spend a good deal of time over at the fields this term, taking the pupils who do not have Games that day over to the pitches at lunchtime. One really does have to remind oneself how fortunate we are to have such extensive fields in the middle of a city.

Exam season has begun. Some elements of Common Entrance Maths and French have been sat this week. I have been very impressed by the calmness of the boys. I believe strongly that we should be training our pupils how to take exams and how to revise. If they arrive at their senior schools knowing how to do so, they will have such an advantage over many of their fellow pupils who have had far less practice.

But it's so important that our pupils continue to develop other skills too. Our Art Exhibition, which is being assembled by Mrs Cottrell as we speak, will be open for viewing after the House Music Competition this time next week. All around the School people are auditioning for the competition, playing musical instruments at all times - during break time, at lunch, in between lessons. The place is awash with sound. Meanwhile, the House songs are underway; this year the theme is a patriotic one in honour of the jubilee. I am looking forward to next week hugely. In the meantime, have a lovely weekend!


#### Christ Church Cathedral School's Art Exhibition



# PEMBROKE AND WORCESTER CHORISTER VOICE TRIALS



I am excited to announce that voice trials for the Worcester and Pembroke Chapel Choirs will take place in school on the morning of 6<sup>th</sup> June. These informal auditions are aimed at boys in Forms 3 and 4, although there are some places available for boys in older years too.

Worcester Choristers sing Tuesday and Sunday chapel evensongs during the eight weeks of Oxford University Term, alongside the student altos, tenors and basses of Worcester Choir. They rehearse at 8.00 am on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, as well as after school on Fridays. Worcester Choristers receive free singing and Theory tuition in school, and are regularly prepared for singing exams.

Pembroke Choristers sing Sunday evensongs in their chapel during the University Term, and there are rehearsals in school at 8.05 am on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Pembroke Chapel Choir is a mixed choir of men and women, but since 2019 Christ Church boys have sung the top line alongside the soprano student members of Pembroke College.

All choristers are popular with senior schools due to their self-discipline, confidence and musicality. The Worcester Choristers have a fine record of winning Music awards to their next schools, and one of our Form 8 boys in Pembroke's first ever intake of choristers was awarded a Music award at St Edward's.

At voice trial, boys will be asked to sing a short, simple piece (something learnt in class, or a favourite hymn will do) and undertake simple aural tests. Everything will be done to ensure boys feel at ease... it really isn't scary at all! Parents who think their son might be interested should contact Miss Biddell (biddell.s@cccs.org.uk).
