# Christ Church Cathedral School

## Dear Parents.

It has been an odd few days sitting at home corresponding with the School via phone and computer, while knowing that the colourful life of the place has been going on. Indeed, I was momentarily panicked when I glanced at the Newsletter proofs this evening when it looked as if the School had been taken over by superheroes, but I quickly recognised some familiar faces behind the costumes!

At any rate, it reminded me of the wonderful gift that freedom is, freedom to come and go as we wish, freedom to enjoy the spring in Oxford, to see the March sunlight shine upon the honey-coloured walls. Those who are self-isolating do not have this freedom, temporarily, but those in places such as Ukraine where wars rage, are seeing their freedoms being taken away from them for the foreseeable future, they are seeing their cities pulverised, their communications disrupted, indeed their very way of life destroyed. Those of us who are fortunate enough to live in Oxford or nearby should constantly remind ourselves of our good fortune. There is a great deal about the present moment which is challenging – prices are rising rapidly, there is a war, Coronavirus has unsettled so much, but there is so much to be thankful for and every day that I wait on Brewer Street and see the excitement of so many of the pupils, some running to get to school, others delighted to see their friends, one realises that it is our duty as a school to ensure that we provide a place of stability and hope, of optimism and moral value for our pupils.

One of the advantages about having to self-isolate was that I was able to listen to 'Thought for the Day' on Radio 4. Today, it was presented by someone for whom I have great admiration and whom I was privileged to meet, the former Bishop of Oxford, Richard Harries. He always speaks with quiet authority and today's three minute talk was no exception. Richard spoke of the importance of truth, particularly at a time of war. He said "Truth is essential to a civilised life." Truth is always the first casualty in a totalitarian state because it is the most dangerous thing to the survival of such a regime. I think one of the most important purposes of a school is to teach pupils the importance of truth, that life is about being truthful and that there are truths beyond dispute. We are doing what we can to support the people of Ukraine in practical ways, by raising money and collecting supplies, and we will continue to do this. But we must also play our part in maintaining a world which understands the value of truth.

On Tuesday, just before my 'exile', I attended the Pre-Prep Concert, which was a wonderful event. Indeed, I heard one teacher say that it was the first Pre-Prep Concert for three years. There were a huge number of people playing — all did so with enthusiasm and skill. I asked all those people in the audience to meet again in the Walton Hall in six years time when our Form 2s will be Form 8s and our Form I boys, Form 7s - judging by what we heard on Tuesday, it is going to be some concert! Put it in your diaries now...

### **Music News**


