Dear Parents,

What a joy it was to see the Forms 3 and 4 Play earlier this week. It was the story of Goldilocks as retold by Roald Dahl. As you can imagine, if you know anything about Roald Dahl, Goldilocks was not portrayed as a charming girl who brings joy to a family of bears, but as a malevolent criminal determined to disrupt a well-ordered domestic life! It was an extremely amusing and entertaining story which was much enjoyed by the audience. We learnt so much from the experience, about, for instance, the remarkable qualities of porridge, which, according to the tale, is "thrilling" and causes hair to grow – I will be having porridge for breakfast from now on. Seeing the play also made me realise just what an appropriate place a Pre-Prep and Prep School is to put on such a show as we were able to supply chairs of differing sizes, a chair for Daddy Bear from a Form 8 classroom, a chair for Mummy Bear from Form 3 classroom and chair for Baby Bear from Reception. It was also a pleasure to see the huge range of creatures that had been assembled. We had a criminal girl, three bears, woodland creatures of various species, policemen, a judge, an auctioneer – a true kaleidoscope of beings. The one thing that they all had in common though was that they could all sing, which they did with such gusto and commitment. What a triumph – it certainly bodes well for the future of Drama at the School.

Today we witnessed one of my favourite occasions, the Christingle Service, when Pre-Prep and Nursery go over to the Cathedral with their Christingles which they have made over the past week. I never fail to be moved by the sight of the many smiling faces lit up by the flickering candles in the darkness of the Cathedral. Miss Farmer spoke movingly about the light in the darkness and I was particularly struck by the thought that these boys and girls have the potential to bring light to a world, which often seems a dark place. We must believe in our children and our passionate hope is that they will go out from this school and their secondary schools keen to make the world a better place. Every one of them has that potential and it is a very moving thought. In the meantime, it was clear that everyone had so much enjoyed themselves creating their Christingles.

Over the past couple of weeks Mme Loyer and Mme Williams set the boys a French challenge – to film themselves doing something which involved speaking in French. Mme Loyer then created a film and at Tuesday's Assembly we watched it. We had two boys who had been to Paris and catalogued the visit with beautiful French sentences; we had another who was teaching us how to make pancakes with immaculate Gallic instructions; we had two tremendous songs, one of which had been composed by the boy who sang it. The catalogue of contributions was delightfully varied. We hear that enthusiasm for Modern Foreign Languages is waning in this country – that is most decidedly not the case at CCCS – in fact the enthusiasm is palpable. Bravo Mesdames!

Meanwhile, Form 8 received a visit from the former High Sherriff Lieutenant of Berkshire today, who has one of the finest collections of Roman coins in private hands. Mr Barker gave a most interesting talk on a few coins he had brought with him, including one splendid example from the reign of the Emperor Nero, whose curly locks and large head were instantly recognisable. On the reverse of the coin was a scene of combat of great vividness. It was extraordinary to feel in touch with a world of so long ago and it did occur to me how lucky our boys are, being taught by such enthusiastic staff as Mr Richards and to have the opportunity to meet such interesting people.




A Concert from the Boys of Christ Church Cathedral Choir

On Tuesday morning, school governor and prize-winning children's author Griselda Heppel came and spoke to all of Year 6 about the wonderful world of story. She told us about inspiration – and how you have to wait for it; about structure – and how you need it; about characters – and how they do not arrive 'ready-made' but form themselves as the narrative develops; about scenes and settings and trees and gardens – and how they morph between remembered reality and imagined fantasy.

I think it is safe to say that Griselda's completely evident passion for her writing and for her three (thus far – more please!) books well and truly rubbed off on the boys. And how good it is for them to see that behind every book they read, there is a writer, with pen or keyboard, thinking, sketching, plotting and planning... and gently smiling as Things Come Together!

After Griselda's presentation, the boys answered and asked a range of excellent questions and by the end of our sixty minutes (distance run) we all had a really good understanding of the 'behind the scenes' working and thinking which go into making a Good Book.

Classics News

Today we were visited by Graham Barker. Mr Graham Barker is a former High Sheriff of Berkshire and a cognoscente of Roman coins, with an enviable and precious collection. He has written a book about coins of the Third Century, and is



currently writing another about the time of Carausius. He gave a talk to Form 8 about the production of coins and their use as propaganda, and showed a few well preserved and exquisite coins from his collection. He told us about the obscure Brexiteering emperor Carausius, who took Britain out of the empire and perhaps built some of the colossal forts around Britain such as Portchester. Our thanks to Mr Barker for taking the time to come to Oxford and give us an energetic and hugely informative talk. NR


Bikeability
