

Christ Church Cathedral School

Friday 27th May 2022

Dear Parents,

Today was a wonderful day. Pupils arrived in the morning clad in red, white and blue, ready to celebrate the seventy years of Her Majesty the Queen's reign. The whole school went to the Cathedral where we were spoken to by the Chaplain of Jesus College, Oxford, The Revd Chris Dingwall Jones, who talked to us movingly about the nature of a jubilee, and that we should make the society in which we lived a jubilee society. There was one moment when he asked a somewhat complex question to the boys. The response which came back from one of the younger boys and which was shouted out at a considerable volume was "Jesus is alive." Even if that wasn't the precise answer to the question, I'm sure it was one which appealed to the Chaplain! The lessons in the morning all had jubilee themes; in Art, Royal carriages were being designed, in DT crowns were being made from wood while in Maths, the area of velvet for The Queen's dress was being calculated using mathematical formulae. The day culminated in lunch, which was held in a playground festooned with bunting and Union Flags. It was another one of those occasions when it was a joy to be part of the School. Mrs Ahluwalia had made a cake with a figure of The Queen on the top. Following the feast, we all sang 'Jerusalem', 'Land of Hope and Glory' and 'Rule Brtiannia'. We finished with the National Anthem. I hope that all the boys remember this occasion. As the boys were leaving the playground, one of the younger pupils looked up and me an said "Happy Jubilee!"

The only sad aspect of the day was that the Cathedral Choristers were not with us, given their trip to Sweden. Nonetheless I have had some spectacular photos back from Mr Robson. Every photo is lit by a brilliant blue light and it is clear that the boys have been to a number of beautiful gothic buildings to sing in. I was delighted to see from one of the photos that the boys had attended a restaurant where there was a Smorgasbord, proving that the Swedes do indeed have such a meal! It s tremendous that we are able to go on school trips abroad again and I am delighted to hear from Mme Loyer that over 30 boys are travelling to Normandy this summer. It seems a very long time ago since the choir went off to Oman in March 2020, a trip which must have been one of the last made in the entire country before lockdown.

People often write to me, but my favourite letters are those I get from the pupils. Form 3 have a tradition of writing to me every year to try to persuade me to consume something called a Snozzcumber, a hideous vegetable which features in Roald Dahl's classic, the BFG. Generally the letters are so persuasive that my natural instinct for survival is overridden and I summon up the courage to insert the disgusting vegetable into my mouth, something I am obliged to do in front of the entire class. More recently Form I have written to me begging me to allow them to keep a meerkat, as if having Gordon, Miss Hunt's dog in attendance is not enough. Various arguments were put forward. He is very fast so would help us with football; he could, I am expected to believe, help with Maths and rid the school of ants. One person even said that the meerkat would help them sit calmly on the carpet. There are clearly some considerable advantages. I am going to have to think quite carefully about this over half term. We have, for a very long time now, been a dog-friendly school – would it be beyond the realms of the ridiculous to become a meerkat-friendly school? I have done some research and note that they generally live underground in groups of about 40 and enjoy digging. Perhaps this might not be the ideal situation for a small prep school in the centre of Oxford.

During the jubilee lunch I went around talking to the happy eaters. I was delighted to sit down and talk to some of the very youngest pupils. After a while I got up to leave and one of my companions said. "No, Mr Murray, you must sit down again and do more talking!" If it wasn't for half term, I suspect I would still be there! Happy Jubilee!

Cricket News




On Wednesday, we played two Colts matches v The Manor Prep School on our school fields.



PEMBROKE AND WORCESTER CHORISTER VOICE TRIALS

I am excited to announce that voice trials for the Worcester and Pembroke Chapel Choirs will take place in school on the morning of 6th June. These informal auditions are aimed at boys in Forms 3 and 4, although there are some places available for boys in older years too.

Worcester Choristers sing Tuesday and Sunday chapel evensongs during the eight weeks of Oxford University Term, alongside the student altos, tenors and basses of Worcester Choir. They rehearse at 8.00 am on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, as well as after school on Fridays. Worcester Choristers receive free singing and Theory tuition in school, and are regularly prepared for singing exams.

Pembroke Choristers sing Sunday evensongs in their chapel during the University Term, and there are rehearsals in school at 8.05 am on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Pembroke Chapel Choir is a mixed choir of men and women, but since 2019 Christ Church boys have sung the top line alongside the soprano student members of Pembroke College.

All choristers are popular with senior schools due to their self-discipline, confidence and musicality. The Worcester Choristers have a fine record of winning Music awards to their next schools, and one of our Form 8 boys in Pembroke's first ever intake of choristers was awarded a Music award at St Edward's.

At voice trial, boys will be asked to sing a short, simple piece (something learnt in class, or a favourite hymn will do) and undertake simple aural tests. Meet and Greet Rebecca Farmer, Head of Pre-Prep

Favourite Book? Jane Eyre, I have to have one nearby and can't seem to stop collecting the odd copy of it if there is something special about the edition. I have read the book so many times, but I still find enjoyment dipping into a chapter.

If you could start something new (hobby/interest or sport) and were not limited with time/age/ money, what would it be? I would have a farm near the coast with Highland cows, Fell ponies, Pigmy goats and lavender Bantams, and of course with a pack of Ruby Cavaliers that follow me as I work.

Any advice on how you relax on them weekend? Don't make plans, check the weather and let it evolve.
