Dear Parents.

It is always interesting when planning term dates to reflect that we have a number of variables to take into account. The first is that if you have the same event on the same day every year for example, Speech Day, the date of that event will get one day earlier each year. At a particular moment you need to move it back a week in order that you don't slip earlier and earlier. But the biggest variable, and the one that causes most discussion, is the date of Easter, something which affects us particularly, given that our Choristers need to be in school during Holy Week. The fixing of the date of Easter is done, as it always has been, by the position of the moon. Easter is on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal equinox (if you see what I mean!) The consequence of this is that the date of Easter can vary by more than a month. This year it was on April 17th which is late, the latest possible date for Easter being April 25th, the earliest March 22nd. The consequence of this is that we find ourselves with an incredibly short summer term in front of us so, more than ever, it is important to make the most of every day.

And we have started as we mean to go on – on the very first day of the term we took part in a Football tournament at Kingham Hill School. It was an odd way to start the Cricket season; on the other hand we have not yet done any Cricket practice and we have a whole term of Football experience in the bank. We took two teams to play against some pretty serious opposition, both of whom played magnificently and, out of the seven and eight teams respectively in their draws, our teams were both runners-up. This is how far our Football has come recently. Many congratulations to those involved - what an excellent way to start our sporting account!

We have a truly action-packed Trinity Term ahead as we emerge out of the clutches of Covid into the bright sunlight. We have our House Music Competition, our Enterprise Days, we have our Sports Day, our Speech Day and an Arts Week, when much of the pupils' work will be on display, and Activities Week. And this is all before we get on to what is central - our academic work, culminating in School Exams and Common Entrance. The Cathedral Choir are going on their first trip abroad in more two years and will be making a recording. And, perhaps, of most historic significance, we will be celebrating the Platinum Jubilee of Her Majesty the Queen, who has, of course, a special connection with the School in that she is the Visitor of Christ Church. We will be holding a special Jubilee street party on the final day of the first half of term. I hope that all the children will always remember taking part in this occasion - after all, even they will never again experience the Platinum Jubilee of a monarch.

I always love Pre-Prep Assembly which I attend on Fridays. Boys are brought forward to have their work or particular behaviour celebrated. There is always such variety on display. One boy had done lots of extra work during the holidays, while another was praised for his outstanding skills in French knitting. Yet another was commended for remaining calm while getting his finger stuck in a pipe. Fortunately, someone was on hand to decouple him from this predicament and both finger and pipe remained unscathed.

There is a Bank Holiday on Monday - the only one in the year that falls during term time. In common with almost all day schools, we will not be in school that day so if you arrive on Brewer Street at 8.00 am on Monday you will not see me there! I hope the weather delivers but, regardless, that you have a wonderful May Bank Holiday weekend.

Football News

Windrush Valley School Tournament - Wednesday 27th April

It's not often we play Football after the Easter break but this year we received an invitation for our U9 & U11 teams to play in the Windrush Valley Tournament, hosted at Kingham Hill School. The weather did its bit to ensure that it still felt, very much, like Football season and our U9 team were grateful to play in the warmth of a brand-new sports hall - a very impressive facility.

Playing a 6 v 6 format, with all six teams playing each other, the U9s began the day with a draw against Rendcomb College. This was followed by three wins on the bounce against Windrush Valley School, Kings School, Witney School and Warwick Prep School. Our boys lost their final game of the tournament against Sibford School and finished in second place behind Rendcomb.

We played some fantastic Football and our boys should be very proud of their efforts; a great way for U9's to finish the football season.

Our U11 team also played 6 v 6, but the eight teams were split into two pools of four, with us playing the three other teams in our pool twice. The boys were on fire throughout the group stage, winning all six of their games, against Windrush Valley School, Kings School, Witney School and Emmanuel Christian School. We finished the group stage on maximum points with 16 goals scored and only one conceded, this was very impressive indeed!

The Final saw us face Sibford School, who had narrowly pipped us to first place at the Bruern Tournament just over a month ago. Sibford had also won 6/6 and were in fine form. The boys were up for the challenge and played very well in the first half, coming in at the break at 0-0. Sibford have a young forward with exceptional ability to finish and this proved to be the difference, taking three chances in quick succession, they were able to put the game out of our reach.

Second place wasn't what the boys wanted but they should be very proud of themselves for producing another fine afternoon of tournament Football. Well done to all of you! PD

What did you want to be when you grew up and what are you doing now? I was a dreamer. Still, uncovering a part of history must give you a sobering buzz. Ataturk, what a man! Maintaining his belief in supporting others, he was right when he said "Teachers are the one and only people who save nations." I am not surprised you like the book 'The Little Prince' a lovely book about the importance of looking beneath the surface to find the actual truth and meaning of a thing, a running theme for you! Writing 24 pages on anything is pretty good as far as I am concerned, but if you feel you need to change the plot you could write about this glamorous, adventurous woman who sang high notes in the dunes, looking for long-lost treasure, only to be hunted down by a gang of thieves, she would lure them in, only to escape their grasp to the twinkly waters of the Aegean sea, in a flying machine she had invented - she sounds really fun.
