Dear Parents,

I am always amazed by the level of enthusiasm in CCCS amongst the pupils. Madame Loyer and Madame Williams have been organising the French Challenge. Boys are asked to do something associated with a French-speaking country whether that be cooking something, singing a song in French or making some local craft. The challenge is entirely voluntary and yet, each year, there are numerous wonderful entries which have clearly been the subject of great effort. The bravest boys then film what they have been doing and Mme Loyer puts snapshots of the projects and videos together to produce a presentation which is shown in Assembly. It is, for me, one of the highlights of the year. Bravo, mes eleves! The deadline for these challenges is on Monday so I hope that you have a suitably Gallic weekend. A similar enthusiasm was evident when Mrs Ponsford launched an initiative this week for pupil librarians. Pupils can apply for the position by filing out a form which asks them about their motivation and what sort of tasks they would like. She tells me there has been a great deal of interest. I look forward very much to seeing how this initiative affects reading in the School.

We already have a very healthy culture of reading. I have been giving mock interviews to our boys in Form 7 who have interviews at Abingdon next week. One of the things I always ask is what they have read recently. I cannot recall the last time someone from CCCS has not been able to talk with enthusiasm about a book they have been reading in their spare time or about something that they have covered in their English lessons. I had a wonderful discussion with one of our boys this week, which showed real insight about Shakespeare's play, Macbeth. I believe absolutely in the importance of reading; there is no activity outside the classroom which does more to develop a pupil's mind. Those who read can think; those who read have active imaginations, those who read write well and those who read express themselves with sophistication – almost inevitably. It is unsurprising that the greatest treasure in Ancient Alexandria was the library, and indeed, here at Oxford, there are few people who wouldn't agree that at the heart of the University lies a library – the Bodleian. I remember when I was at prep school watching Peter Schaffer's play, the Royal Hunt of the Sun, about the Spanish Conquistadors' arrival in Peru. The Spaniards under Pizarro meet the Emperor Atahualpa. They read the bible to him. The Emperor, who has never seen a book before, can see that that it speaks to the Spaniard but he does not understand how. He takes the bible form the Spaniard and puts it up to his ear, hoping to hear it speak. Few things have ever summed up for me so vividly the magical quality of books.

Next Saturday it is our Open Morning and, in the afternoon, Chorister for a Day. If you have a boy in the Prep School, please remember that they will be needed in school between 9.30 am and 12.00 noon. Please look out for more details of the exact timings. If you know of anyone who might be interested in the School please encourage them to register for the Open morning. Furthermore, do please think about whether your son or anyone you know might be interested in a Cathedral Choristership. A Cathedral Choristership is a wonderful opportunity in so many ways, having life-long benefits. If any of you are interested in exploring this option, please let Mrs kemp know and come along to the afternoon next Saturday. It should be a most enjoyable afternoon.

I am delighted to let you know that we have been joined by two new members of the cleaning staff, Raimonta Michalari and Tina Lawrence. I would like to take this opportunity to welcome them to the School and to commend the cleaning staff for the invaluable work that they do for us behind the scenes. I suspect we take it for granted that the place is clean but I know how much effort it really takes. In terms of cleanliness, we also heard today that our kitchens have retained their five star rating following an unannounced visitation from the Oxford City Environmental Health Officer – I am delighted that this is the case and wish also to commend our splendid kitchen staff run so ably by Mr Kilby, who continues to provide us with so many delicious and nourishing meals.

I am so struck by the delightfulness of our pupils. I was working in my study the other day when there was a knock at the door. A boy appeared. "How are you, Sir?" "Well thank you," I responded. I continued: "How can I help?" "Oh you can't really, thank you. I didn't want to do much other than to say hello and wish you a good journey home. Good bye!" and off he went. As it happens, he could not have done more.




















Life Skills Club

Meet and Greet Jue Gao - Parent of Carl and Lucas

What did you want to be when you grew up and what are you doing now? I had a head packed full of strange ideas when I was a child. I thought I would be a Scientist to create something small but imaginative and valuable. After being a mum, I left my over ten-year legal career and started my family role. I kept reading and buying books for my kids. Then I set up a Chinese-English library. I also volunteered at the local city library, community nursery and primary school as a lecturer, storyteller and after-school club teacher.

Two years ago, part of my work in China paused. I became a full-time University student, and my teaching work with Chinese students moved online. I also volunteer in Old Marston Library for the children's reading club and am a ministry teacher at the Oxford Chinese Gospel Church. With the arrival of my over-eight thousand Chinese books recently, I will set up a Chinese children's library.

If you could travel anywhere in the world tomorrow, where would you go and why? Jasper, in Canada. I visited the city four years ago. Since I have been looking after my younger son, I have missed the glaciers and the auroras. It is said that what you've missed is always the best. I want to get there for the best.

Who is your idol, and why? I don't have an idol, but I always try to learn from others around me. My parents greatly affected my attitude to life. My father started playing the piano in his sixties, and my mother learned to swim at over fifty five. They are still doing these now.

There is a lot I have learnt from the teachers at CCCS. From Mme Loyer, who introduced the road safety rules to me - life skills are as essential as academic knowledge. From Miss Kat, who explained her experience of helping children misbehave. From Miss Biddell, who advised me how to encourage children at their first show. I also learnt how to be creative to get children involved, from Mrs Merriman and how to be organized in school events from Miss Farmer, how to be patient with children from Mrs Ahluwalia. Mr Murray's writings in the Newsletters constantly update my thinking about education through little things.

I also learnt from other parents. Jenny, who helped the Chinese community connect. Dominic, who is active and responsive in school activities. Tzen, Gebmi, and Amanda, who are always warm hearts to help other parents.

Favourite city or town and in which season? Beijing in autumn is the best season, covered with yellow ginkgo leaves and red maple leaves. It is attractive.

One thing you would change in the world if you could? If I could do something, I would help every child to get various affordable educational resources of good quality. There are still hundreds of millions of children who are out of school. Children as refugees, girls and low-income households are missing out on education worldwide.

Is there a family trait/habit that you have? Working with parents is a habit in my family. My father worked as the assistant to my grandfather when they did the smithcraft. I always sat beside my father with a carpenter's plane while he was making furniture. I am proud to have my two sons as teaching assistants when I teach in Mandarin School and Sunday School. Carl helps me set up the laptop and electric facilities. Lucas collects handouts and homework.

Favourite Book? I love books, whether they are academic books from my legal and management background or children's books from my reading experience with kids. My memorial book is Stories of 'Stupid' Kids, which I read at primary school. It is about the childhoods of lots of great people, how childhood affects people and how adults could learn from children.

If you could start something new (hobby/interest or sport) and were not limited with time/age/money, what would it be? I want to learn to sail and explore an open world in the ocean. With wind, peace and freedom in nature, it would be a different life experience from living on the land. But I must overcome my fear of water when I learn to sail.

Any advice on how you relax at the weekend? Hiking is my favourite way to relax, especially in a forest area. We have the 24-solar system in Chinese culture, to describe natural changes during different solar days. When you hike in a woodland setting, you can feel the changes in plants and animals, plus the connection between humans and nature, which also helps you relax and better understand human behaviour. We are not separated, we are part of nature. So do not pen yourself in your house - go hiking to a natural place to relax.

It is hard to believe that so much goodness exists in one person. You'll recognise Jue, as in rain, hail or snow, Jue will be cycling along the Abingdon Road with a huge, warm smile, rain beating down hard and she still manages the big friendly wave, accompanying the boys to school. Creating a Chinese-English library is such a fantastic idea and they are enormously lucky to have you at the helm. It is hard to comprehend how difficult it can be, blending cultures, but you can't beat a book to be the universal saviour of breaking down barriers. I really enjoyed reading that you have Carl and Lucas working already, we need to give Carl a work phone that we can all call him on, 24/7, with our IT problems as I have heard he is very good. You've inspired me to cycle on the roads, but don't get me wrong, it doesn't come naturally, I lack the finesse and ability to do the big wave like you as my two hands firmly cling on for dear life, but nothing like having someone to look up to. Thank you Jue, we are lucky as a school community to have you.
