Dear Parents,

As many of you may have heard, one of the greatest novelists of our age, Hilary Mantel, died suddenly last week. She was most famous for her trilogy about the life of the controversial Tudor Statesman, Thomas Cromwell. Uniquely, two of the three novels, Wolf Hall and Bring Up the Bodies, won the Booker Prize.

The genius of Mantel's work seems to me to lie in two areas. Firstly, her evocation of the middle years of the reign of Henry VIII is breathtakingly vivid. Her immersion in this world seems complete and her understanding of the characters and their minds, as well as the extraordinary understanding of the details of every day life, never cease to weave their magic. She always said that it took a few months to readjust to the 21st Century once she had finished writing the books.

Secondly I believe that Mantel's portrayal of Cromwell is one of the finest portraits in modern literature. As one reads the novels it is impossible not to feel real sympathy for him – no mean feat given that for most historians, and indeed in the common imagination, Cromwell does not have a good press. Mantel's understanding that sometimes compromise, the application of common sense and an acceptance of the inevitable is far less damaging than the dogged devotion to uncompromising principle, is very striking. To persuade a reader to view a character and an era from a completely different perspective is an extraordinary feat on the part of a novelist.

Much of Wolf Hall also gives us a generally positive portrait of Thomas Wolsey, the founder of Cardinal College from which Christ Church was born. Mantel said of Wolsey in an interview: "I love Wolsey because he enjoyed it all so much. I know all the reasons for thinking badly of him but I can never be quite persuaded. And I absolutely understand why you'd be englamoured by him. And also he seems to me to have been a man with a heart and I can quite understand Cromwell's long loyalty to him." If one looks at the portrait in the Great Hall at Christ Church, with its evident signs of good living, one can appreciate what she means! If you haven't read these works I could not recommend them more highly.

I think education should teach one to be open to looking at things from different perspectives – open-mindedness is one of the greatest qualities that an education can encourage. I am completely committed to it as a core characteristic of the education which we provide at Christ Church. Next week I will be attending the joint IAPS (Independent Association of Prep Schools) / HMC (Headmasters' and Headmistresses Conference.) The conference is entitled: "Enlightened Education" and I look forward very much to reporting back to you next week about some of the enlightening ideas that will be shared.

We should always ask questions about the purpose of education, how we can make it more effective and about how we should adapt it to suit the needs of the modern world. Conferences such as the one next week are sources of enlightenment and inspiration, I believe it is of fundamental importance that one's views and theories are challenged.

I don't think I have ever succeeded before in producing such a miracle but I will certainly attempt to repeat the process – though I suspect that miracles, by definition, are not supposed to be repeatable!
