Dear Parents,

Thank you so much to all the parents of Prep School boys who made it possible for your sons to be with us on Saturday morning for our Open Morning. I know that this commitment means that they miss all sorts of activities - nonetheless it is very important for us as a school. Thanks to your support, it all seemed to go very well. As ever, those parents visiting were particularly complimentary about our Form 8 boys, who had been doing the guiding. Again and again I heard about the boys' politeness and maturity. Coincidentally, I was listening to the radio last night and I heard the obituary of a 98 year old comedian who had the ability of making his audiences laugh simply by uttering a catch phrase, something which seemed so easy and natural. The person who was reminiscing said that this ability was anything other than easy and that it required skill and hard work. "He was, when delivering a line, metaphorically making souffles, as light as air but which required huge skill." In the same way, being polite, mature and thoughtful at the age of 12 is something that requires a huge amount of hard work. It too is akin to making soufflé. Our boys behave in the mature way that they do because the School prioritises such behaviour every day - manners are something that we insist upon. There are very many arguments to be made in favour of boys staying in a Prep School until the age of 13, but for me, the most important one is that by the time they leave, boys have a real sense of maturity because they are our senior boys at a time when they have the ability to take on responsibility. Meanwhile, those who have moved to a senior school at 11 will be junior pupils in large school at the same age as our Form 8s but with the institution looking to 16 or 18 year olds to be the oldest pupils.

An aspect of the School which our pupils make the most of is the glorious Cotswold stone wall which forms one of the boundaries of our playground. The wall has a basketball net in front of it and is often used to kick balls against – no wonder then that its windows have a latticework of protective bars across them. I happen to know that a rather elegant library shelters behind the darkened windows, a library into which occasionally a ball is conveyed by a wayward foot. This building is Campion Hall, which is the Oxford home of the Jesuit order, a Roman catholic order of which the present Pope is a member. It is a very striking building and was designed by the early 20th Century architect, Edwin Lutyens. I mention this because Lutyens was the architect responsible for the building of the Cenotaph, the country's principal war memorial in Whitehall where, yesterday, the new King led the remembrance ceremony for the first time. Two days earlier, on Friday 11th, at 11 o'clock, we remembered former pupils from this school who had died in the war. One of our Form 7 boys played the Last Post on his trumpet very movingly, the sound echoing off the walls of Lutyens' building. Peter Middleton, the former Headmaster of Welbeck Military College, who spoke in the Cathedral on Friday, reminded us that though remembering was of absolute importance, the remembering must also change us and ensure that we never adopt the sort of behaviour that might lead us towards war.

Last week we held a governors' meeting. The governors are the group of people ultimately responsible for a school. Our governors are a hugely eminent group of people with great expertise in various walks of life, all of which are useful for the oversight of our school. The considerable time they give up to the business of running the school, they give freely. We are very fortunate in the governors we have. At most occasions, including, for instance, Open Day, a governor is present. Please introduce yourself to any governors who attend events as they would be more than happy to meet you. It is with great sadness that I let you know that our Chairman of Governors, the Sub Dean of Christ Church, Richard Peers, is leaving us. He has been appointed as Dean of Llandaff, the Anglican Cathedral of Cardiff. We will miss Richard greatly as he was a great supporter of the School, including a regular preacher to the School in the Cathedral, and a frequent attender of school events. I wish to send him all our very best wishes for this exciting new venture. He will be replaced in his role as Chair of Governors by The Revd Canon Sarah Foot, Censor Theologiae of Christ Church.

On Thursday, my squash club came just before the governors' meeting. I told the boys I would need to leave the court five minutes early because there was a governors meeting. "Well," said one boy, "Just be yourself..... Be cool!" How encouraging, if misguided, he was!


Trinity Music Exams


Remembrance Day
