

Christ Church Cathedral School

Dear Parents.

I was invited yesterday by St Edward's School to hear one of their pupils play the violin, not perhaps a remarkable thing you might think. But when I tell you that the pupil was playing at the Queen Elizabeth Hall in the Southbank Centre in London, as the principal soloist in the Beethoven violin concerto alongside the London Mozart Players, you might think again. Leia Zhu's performance was, judging by any normal criteria, extraordinary. As well as being technically faultless, she seemed to have mastered the emotions of this dense piece. One had to keep reminding oneself that she had not yet taken her GCSEs. As you might imagine, Leia received a standing ovation afterwards. In her interview before the performance, Leia came across as a thoughtful and self-effacing young person, seemingly completely unspoilt by her early success. When asked about the fact that, at 16, she was tackling such a profound piece, so central to the violinist's canon, she said "I am young, but that doesn't mean that it's too early - for all players, interpreting such a piece is a life-long journey." Given the seemingly faultless nature of her performance, I thought this a very telling remark. There is always another way of looking at a great piece of music and the way one looks at it when young, might be different from the way one looks at it when more mature. I did think though, that Leia was very fortunate in being able to have accomplished an interpretation by the age of 16! At the end of the interview, she looked at the conductor and said: "Let's do this!" By the end of the performance we realised, to our delight, that it had been well and truly done!

Leia did make me think about the nature of education. Education, too, is a life-long process. Of course it is most vital when one is young where there is so much to learn – so much indeed that it is one's full time job. But one should never feel it is too late to learn. Aristotle famously wrote, "The more you know the more you realise you don't know." This could not be a more apt reflection upon the experience of taking up a curious mind in relation to the world and I am delighted if pupils leave CCCS with an understanding that their education has only just begun. This is really one of the most important lessons that we can teach our pupils.

In the Cathedral this morning we had our first Eucharist of the year. The Eucharist is the most important service of the Church, going back to the Last Supper and Jesus's instruction to his disciples to "Do this in remembrance of me." Meeting together in the Cathedral is a central moment of our week and I wanted to mention again that we are in the Cathedral every Friday morning and that you are most welcome to join us. There is coffee afterwards for any parents who are available and we would love to see you. We often have speakers from outside, often Heads from senior schools, who will always be happy to meet parents attending.

On Wednesday, in my beginning of term assembly, I spoke to the Prep School about the fact that I had watched, with my sons, the Lord of the Rings trilogy over the holidays. Most of the pupils knew quite a bit about Tolkien's world of fantasy. I was at pains to tell them though that I considered Tolkien's world to be much closer to home than might initially have been supposed. I pointed out that Tolkien had lived for almost all his life in Oxford; that the two Colleges with which he had been most closely associated were Pembroke and Merton, one next to our School on the other side of Brewer Street, the other next to our playing fields. I told the boys that many of Tolkien's creatures had origins in Oxford - the Orcs, for instance, in carvings in a local chapel, the Ents, the walking trees, upon a tree in the Botanic Gardens. Furthermore, his landscape borrowed heavily from the landscapes around Oxford. But the nature of the world in which the characters lived also owed a great deal to the real world. In the Lord of the Rings there is, of course, a battle between the forces of light and darkness, between good and evil. I said that I did not believe that this was a matter of fantasy and that such battles occurred, generally less dramatically, in the real world. Most of us, I said, are trying to act well and that this often means that we are battling to ensure that our good inclinations triumph over those which are less admirable. It is always worth trying to be the best possible version of ourselves.

At the end of the talk one of the boys came up to me and said "I was very interested to hear that what you are saying is that the Lord of the Rings is a metaphor for the psychological and emotional battles between good and evil" I couldn't have, and indeed didn't, put it better!
