

Christ Church Cathedral School

Dear Parents,

About 50 miles to the west of Oxford lies one of the most fertile parts of England, the Severn Valley. Its gently rolling landscape is made up of lush fields and verdant hedgerows interspersed with charming villages of brick and thatch. Nothing, therefore, prepares you for the dramatically steep hills that rise up from this gentle country and which run in a North-South direction for about 10 miles. They are known as the Malvern Hills and are some of the oldest rock in the world, being 670 million years old. Early on, people were drawn to them, both for their dramatic outlook and for a less obvious but no less miraculous feature, their wells of crystal clear water. We now know that the hills act as a remarkable natural filtering system, the water falling on them as rain, slowly percolating through fissures in the hills, removing all the impurities. For several hundred years people have come to drink the water and both Queen Elizabeth I and Queen Victoria would drink little else.

Yesterday, I visited Malvern College which sits at the bottom of the hills. It is, given its position, a wonderful environment, having elevated views across the Vale of Severn to the Cotswold escarpment. All this was impressive enough but I was also very struck by its holistic approach to education. Academic endeavour is, of course, central to everything they do, and their results are excellent, but the academic is placed in the context of a pupil's wider life. At Malvern the Director of Academics is also Director of Co-curricular, something I have not seen at another senior school. The two, the school claim, should go hand in hand. Societies are flourishing at Malvern, largely because of the fact that the pupils run them themselves only calling upon members of staff when needed. Giving pupils responsibility in this way teaches them a great deal and I was impressed by the Malvernians whom I met who seemed both charming and engaging. I was reminded that places of education can be immensely benevolent. We are so fortunate in the many senior schools we feed and we take great care in getting to know them so that we can help you choose the best school for your son.

As you may have heard, in our Prep School, from this term, we have combined what were two single clubs sessions into one double club session on a Thursday afternoon which should allow us to expand what we are able to achieve in a clubs session. Often 40 minutes was not quite long enough to achieve very much. We now have the capacity to do more. For instance, cooking will now be able to feature in the excellent Life Skills Club. Mr Richards and Mr Farmer are also using the longer sessions to forge ahead with the school play. I am looking forward to seeing this in the last part of the term and hope you will all be able to come on either Friday 17th or Saturday 18th March. As ever, Mr Richards has written the play himself with some of the actors in mind. The story revolves around a knight who finds being a knight somewhat taxing. I look forward to discovering more!

We have been hugely fortunate in the members of staff who have joined us this term. We have three fantastic new Gappers, Hamish, Alastair and Alfie, all of whom come from Australia and have flung themselves into school life with real vigour. Mr Herbert has also joined us to help with sport and with supporting children. He has already made a huge impact on both these areas, and in Pre-Prep Miss Helen and Miss Hajar have joined us as Teaching Assistants and have been such positive presences in the classes they are supporting. The one common feature of all these new appointments is their enthusiasm both about life in general and about the School and it is a real joy to have them with us.

I was delighted to award a prize at the Pre-Prep Assembly for kindness. I can't think of anything more worthwhile than such a prize; if our pupils can learn such things when they are really young, then they will never forget them. These life lessons are as essential today as they have ever been.

We had the whole school in Cathedral today. I told the pupils about a trip I had taken to the City of Jaipur in India, where I had seen animals everywhere around the town. I asked the boys to guess which animals I had seen walking around the streets. The first response I received was "A Tiger!" Despite the fact that India is a place of the unexpected, I think Tigers on the loose would be a step too far.....

Within Tom Tower



There was much else to see: the small, sturdy clock mechanism, a large old




