With fresh air aplenty, pupils play at least an hour of sport a day, and the school has upped its outdoor activity provision with climbing walls and assault courses. Or maybe it's the prep's 'first-class' pastoral care and the commitment to outreach (Cheam awards lifechanging bursaries). The winning combination of these factors results in waiting lists for many yeargroups. 'Polite, fun, interesting and nterested' leavers head to Eton, Marlborough and Downe House.

Head Richard Murray **Pupils** 140 day and boarding: 135 boys, 5 girls Ages 3–13 Term Fees Day: £6,385; boarding (choristers only): £4,460 With only 140 pupils, CCCS is small but mighty – and rightfully proud of its size: 'It's a great advantage and ensures that every pupil is noticed, included and nurtured.' Naturally, as a choir school founded by King Henry VIII, 'the dulcet tones of musical instruments can be regularly heard along the corridors'. There are three choirs and, in 2021, 50 per cent of leavers won music awards to senior schools such as Teddies and Winchester. But one parent is keen to dispel the notion that this is just a musical establishment: 'It's so much more than that'. Boys learn how to darn socks and affix buttons in the sewing club; there's a woodland school; and planning permission has been granted for a new sports pavilion.

COTHILL HOUSE •

During the Second World War, boys at Cothill were tasked with making Molotov cocktails in the event the German army should roll through rural Oxfordshire. Today, the school describes itself as 'the HQ for boys' adventures'. One parent stresses that 'there is nothing snooty or pompous' about the place. Head Duncan Bailey is a 'breath of fresh air' and believes that children 'must be as unlike a machine as possible'. Work is under way on a £6m state-of-the-art sports centre and the school has been an IAPS ski champion since 2019. Parents love that Cothill achieves excellent results 'without the drama, stress and pressure of London day schools'. Sixty per cent of boys go on to Eton, Winchester, Radley or Harrow, with a healthy haul of scholarships.

COTTESMORE SCHOOL ••

Ages 8–13 Term Fees £9,932 According to parents, 'Cottesmore is a magical little corner of the world', where 'children are allowed to scamper around and have fun'. Head Tom Rogerson is 'friendly and high-spirited', and his musical influence is ubiquitous (more than 90 per cent of students learn an instrument). Four new classrooms have been unveiled, and £200,000 invested in a girls' cricket pitch. The Croft - where pupils enjoy agriculture sessions - is thriving (as are its Japanese quails, chickens, pigs and rescue ducks). Cottesmore recently hosted a Quidditch tournament for local schools; ski trips are back on; and the archaeology club is popular. Last year's leavers won scholarships to Charterhouse, Benenden and Harrow.
