

# Christ Church Cathedral School

#### Dear Parents,

It was a real pleasure to attend the Forms 3 and 4 concert on Tuesday afternoon. The number of pupils who were performing was extraordinary and the variety of pieces that they played, equally so. We travelled to all parts of the globe - to the Wild West, to Paris, and to the desert. We also listened to many types of animals described musically - worms and spiders for instance. It was very heartening that so many of our pupils, at such a young age, performed with great panache, entertaining us all. The future of music at Christ Church Cathedral School is bright. The concert began with Alexander Sun playing the Flight of the Bumblebee. Had I have closed my eyes I would've imagined myself in a concert hall. Alexander summoned up the buzzing bees with great accuracy and mastery of the keys, it was exquisite. The concert ended with William Liu playing as if he were in a jazz club. William's syncopation was exemplary and I really felt the colour of the music. There were some performers who had only just begun to play their instruments, it was delightful to hear some of their first notes and I am amazed that they had the confidence to perform publicly.

I hope the pupils enjoyed hearing Susan Wessels, Second Master at Marlborough College, speaking at Cathedral Assembly this morning. I was sorry to miss the occasion but I was attending my mother's funeral today. I have no doubt that Ms Wessels will have inspired the pupils when talking about her experiences as an Olympic Hockey player. Her visit is particularly well-timed, given that we have just reintroduced Hockey into our sporting curriculum. The boys have been making regular visits to the Christ Church Astroturf on the other side of the Cherwell. I hope that listening to Ms Wessels will have inspired the boys to aim high! We will be trying out a number of new sports this year and we will be visiting the Astroturf again next term to play Tennis.

I used to live in a Boarding House during my time at St Edward's school. It was, therefore, lovely this week to be back on Boarding House duty on Tuesday. I spent the evening being beaten at Uno, being beaten at table football and reading stories to the boys just before they went to bed. One forgets how many wonderful conversations one has while sitting around in a Boarding House. I am so grateful to all the Boarding Staff at the School to ensure that it is such a lovely community. I am delighted that there are greater number of pupils enjoying Flexi Boarding this term, gaining experience of this wonderful way of life. Flexi Boarding at CCCS is, as the name implies, flexible: given that the Choristers are already boarding, we are always up and running and can respond to requests with as little as one day's notice. It was lovely to hear that one boy has been offered one night a week of boarding for the rest of this academic year.

As many of you may know, the closure of the Botley Road has been announced as starting in April. I wrote to you a while ago about our plans to combat this state of affairs. We will have a Gapper waiting by the bridge and then we will pick pupils up with our minibus - please watch this space. For any parents who are going to find this all too much, I refer you back to my previous paragraph - Flexi Boarding awaits!

I'm delighted to say that this Newsletter has spawned a child. In Assembly yesterday, Form 4 eloquently announced the creation of a Pupil Magazine. One of the reasons given for having a Pupil Magazine is that parents have a Newsletter all to themselves, so the pupils need one too. Forms 3 and 4 have had lots of fun in Clubs this term, with lots of team building activities. In Book Club we have created comics, in Science Club we made periscopes and catapults, and in Modelling Club we created clay dragon eyes! SG, CS, JR,



Robotics Club has had great fun over the past few weeks making models using their Crumble controllers. Among other things, we now have:

- a robotic car with flashing lights
- a robotic car which reverses when it approaches an object
- a buzzer which increases in volume and frequency when an object gets closer to it
- a game with a toy on a rocker; the player needs to press the button at the right time to save the toy

The boys have designed their constructions and built them out of electronic components and card; they have then programmed them using Crumble software, which has many of the same features as Scratch. Finally, the boys unplugged their models from the computers and hey presto - robotics! Well done to all the boys taking part. AF










## **School Play**


