

Christ Church Cathedral School

Dear Parents,

Yesterday, the whole school enjoyed the visit from a Scientist who came to see us from Science Oxford. The Scientist's presentation began by everyone shouting very loudly at him, something they needed to do because he had donned a pair of ear defenders. This outburst of noise led on to his drawing out from the boys an understanding of the nature of sound. What occurred to me while I was watching was how curious our pupils are about the world around them and indeed how much they know. There is huge thirst to discover things and, as a consequence, and thanks to Mrs Simpkin's inspiring teaching, the Science Lab at CCCS is a place of real adventure. Science will be the clue to solving many of the world's problems and to enhancing the lives of the world's population in the future and I am delighted that so many of our pupils clearly love the subject - there are few more powerful tools.

The School Play 'All Is Not Lost' was a triumph. As ever, Mr Richards' script was a masterpiece of wit and invention, every line being a delight. The boys rose magnificently to the occasion and the stage sparkled with committed and engaging performances. The Play was about a knight who had become so distracted by music that he was not able to perform his knightly duties of dealing with dragons and all those other perils which beset knights. Eventually, of course, all is well and the play ends with a song demonstrating the power of music. I am thrilled at the quality of Drama at our school.

And this week we were reminded of the power of music to engage our pupils when we received the results of the Trinity Music exams. For the first time since Ms Biddell joined CCCS, 15 years ago, every single exam result was gained with either a Merit or a Distinction and many of the grades were at a very high level, including two Grade 6 Distinctions and one Grade 8 Distinction. I cannot overstate the significance of these results and I wish to congratulate the boys involved as well as Ms Biddell, who is largely responsible for music being so integral to the School.

This afternoon, as I looked out of the window, the hue of the scene changed from colour to grey and within seconds there was a deluge. I looked at the clock and saw that it was ten minutes before the Pre-Prep Egg Hunt in the Cathedral Garden. This doesn't look good, I thought. Nonetheless I walked over St Aldates, crossed Tom Quad and went into the Cathedral. I was greeted by crowds of expectant parents but no pupils. Would they be coming? As we sheltered in the West End of the Cathedral, we noticed that a glimmer of colour was appearing, and, before our very eyes, the panorama returned. We filed out into the garden, one of those featured in Alice in Wonderland. We waited – still no pupils. Eventually we heard a slight padding of feet and then round the corner came the Nursery pupils sheltering under their Easter bonnets. And then more and more came. Miss Farmer had sensibly determined that they should dodge the rain – something they had successfully done. Soon afterwards the children were sent off to look for the hidden eggs with the strict instructions to find one only. Even with this stricture the excitement was intense!

No such limits had been placed upon the pupils I encountered when I returned to the main building where I found the Prep boys hunting for eggs. "I hope you haven't exceeded your one." I stated in a headmasterly way. "Hmm," replied the boy, "I've found 11." Some people were clearly thinking big.

May I wish you all a thoroughly enjoyable if not egg-filled Easter!

show called 'Wow to Wonder' and we were truly wowed by some visually spectacular experiments involving chemical reactions.
