

# Christ Church Cathedral School

Dear Parents,

This Wednesday was an important day. Until this week, we must have been one of the only schools in the country to have played Real Tennis but not Lawn Tennis. On Wednesday this changed, as boys from the School played in our first Tennis match for a very long time – indeed, I cannot remember when the last Tennis match occurred. Mr Harrison, Head of Sport, has decided that Lawn Tennis should be back on the curriculum – so now we play both games. The remarkable news is that we won our match convincingly, an extraordinary feat given that we have not yet had any practices. What will we be like once those begin! Having said that, it was the legendary singing duo, Flanders and Swann (both of whom, incidentally were undergraduates at Christ Church) who wrote in an ironic song about English attitudes to other countries' sports:

"And all the world over, each nation's the same They've simply no notion of playing the game They argue with umpires, they cheer when they've won And they practice beforehand, which ruins the fun!"

Times have changed, you will be relieved to hear, and that practice is part of our approach to all things, including sport. In fact practice is something we are taking very seriously at the moment in terms of our preparation for Senior School Pre-Tests. Mrs Fairhurst, our Academic Deputy, is now beginning this preparation in Form 4 and we are ensuring that mock ISEB Pre-Tests, which are now demanded by most senior schools, are part of the assessment schedule. We will be writing to you about the details of this in the near future.

If you look down the passage by the side of No 3, Brewer Street during the school day, you will see a large number of bikes leaned up against the wall. This week, both sides of the path have been chockablock with bicycles, partly because we have been running a Bikeability course. The course is designed to ensure that young people can cycle safely. This is an immensely useful course given how many people are using their bikes to get to school. Every term the percentage of people coming into school by bike increases. One of the advantages to being right in the centre of town is that we are relatively close to everywhere in Oxford, and near to the station, so, cycling is a realistic option for so many.

We have so many pupils who are avid readers and yet we do not have a dedicated room to house our many books, other than the main English classroom. The time has come for us to have a library and we are about to convert the old changing room, a beautiful large airy room, which we no longer use, into a library. Our hope is that it should be a place of magical journeys, a place where boys can lay down habits of reading which will never leave them. I look forward to sharing details about this exciting project with you very soon.

One of my favourite times of the week is when I do duty in the playground on Thursday mornings. It allows me to have 20 minutes with the pupils when I have no purpose other than to be with them. I stand outside by the snack trolley waiting to see who will open the conversation. One of the boys comes up to me fairly quickly. "Can you help me with my banana; the yellow bit doesn't seem to be coming off and I can't eat it like this." Fortunately, after years of banana consumption, I know exactly what to do and the boy leaves, happily eating his skinned banana. It's always good to be of help. Shortly afterwards another boy appears, this time clutching a piece of paper in his left hand and, in his right, a white feather. He looks at me with a certain degree of pride "I'm composing a symphony, Sir. Can I show you the opening movement?" He passes me a manuscript with carefully written notes. "It's in D Minor." Another boy then appears, pushing the composer aside, "Sir, watch what I can do." He is holding a hoop which, with a ferocious flick of the wrist, he casts into the air. It lands on the ground and then shoots back towards the boy who plucks it up again. "A boomerang hoop!" he exclaims. "Now your turn, Sir." I really am in a place of life-long education, I think – there are always new skills to acquire. And then the boy who likes conundra appears, waiting with anticipation. "Right," I begin, "A man lives on the top floor of a skyscraper......." And so it goes on. I have to pinch myself so often at CCCS – are the boys really this engaging? Everyone seems to flourish here and pupils' enthusiasm is palpable. It is a great privilege to work here.

#### **Music News**

Over Easter I travelled to Antigua to work with 'Playing to Inspire', an extraordinary musical project led by the Kanneh-Mason family (7 virtuoso siblings who play keyboard and string instruments, aged 13 to 25). The Kanneh-Masons hail from Nottingham but have Antiguan roots, and they are in their fifth year of bringing orchestral music to this beautiful corner of the Caribbean. Also on this year's team was BBC presenter and saxophonist Jess Gillam, and conductor Tom Featherstonhaugh of the BSO.

I coached chamber groups, conducted the Junior Symphony Orchestra, rehearsed the Youth Choir, played in the Youth Symphony Orchestra and accompanied soloists. We performed twice for the Prime Minister and twice for the Governor General, in large venues and at fundraising recitals. In some ways it was very much like being at CCCS, although most of the rehearsals were at a sweltering cricket stadium quite unlike Brewer Street! The young musicians are brimming with talent, and the local tutors do excellent work even though some are still only in their early 20s.

Prime Minister Gaston Browne spoke movingly of how access to high quality music has a profound effect on young people. It was impossible to escape comparisons with the UK's hesitant approach to arts funding, and to wish for a similar approach back at home. He also described music as an exportable product, and aims to make Antigua the chief hub for musical excellence in the Caribbean. This is already becoming reality, as this Easter the ABRSM sponsored three music students from the Dominican Republic (population 10 million) to attend Playing to Inspire in Antigua (population 90,000!).

This is my second visit to work with orchestras on the island, and in 2018 CCCS hosted a return visit by the National Youth Choir of Antigua. Some parents may also remember a 2017 fund-raising concert in the presence of Antigua's High Commissioner H.E. Karen-Mae Hill OBE, after a hurricane hit Barbuda. I hope that CCCS can sustain this unique connection, and that we can find more ways to support the tremendous musicians of Playing to Inspire.

In the meantime, if you have an orchestral instrument sitting unused at home, and if you would consider donating it, please let me know. It will be welcomed with open arms in Antigua...! SB

During Holy Week, our Cathedral Choristers returned for their usual commitment of Easter Services. At the start of the week (Palm Sunday) the boys are always eager to see the Donkey process through Tom Quad. The boys were in fine voice throughout the week, rounding out Easter Sunday Eucharist with Vierne's Messe Solenelle, a remarkable work scored for choir and two organs. Vierne originally intended to score the Mass for Orchestra and Choir but was convinced to accompany the work with Organs for practical reasons by his teacher, Widor. How fitting it was therefore that the choir were played out by Professor Grahl playing Widor's famous Toccata. JR

It's always an exciting event, so it would be excellent to see lots of you there. If you can't join us in the afternoon, the competition will be professionally live-streamed and available to watch afterwards too.
