Dear Parents,

I will be at the Choir Schools Association annual conference in Worcester for two days next week. The Choir Schools Association is an excellent organisation which helps promote the work of those schools at which choristers are educated. There are various issues that are matters of discussion in the choir school world. One is the recruitment of choristers, which very many choirs have found difficult recently. Interestingly, I will be saying that we still have three boys choirs, that singing in the School seems to be a very popular pastime and that our Worcester and Pembroke choirs are very popular at the moment - with increasing numbers as I write. We also have a full set of Probationers for next year in the Cathedral Choir. If your son is keen to sing in one of our choirs, please approach Ms Biddell, who would be pleased to hear from you. It is one of the most remarkable sides to our school, which brings great pleasure to those who sing, and the many who hear them.

Yesterday, I was fortunate enough to attend a seminar given by a wonderful organisation called Into University. Their aim is to support the education of people from more deprived areas. Christ Church is a great supporter of Into Universities Blackbird Leys Centre. Young people there are inspired to take education seriously and are often invited to visit Christ Church itself. We are thinking of ways in which we might be able to support pupils of our boys' age. I think this would be an outstanding brief and I'm certain we could help to inspire the many pupils who come their way. Oxford is an extraordinary place, it has some of the finest educational institutions in the world and yet less than two miles away are some of the most educationally deprived children in the country. I'm sure we could help to address this issue.

I often marvel at the ingenuity of our pupils. I was, as I always am, on break time duty this Thursday morning. Up comes a pupil holding pencil. "Sir would you like to have your Chicken Pox injection?" The smiling boy asked, looking in my direction. I didn't feel certain that the object which he held in his hand looked as if it would supply a potent remedy. Nonetheless it did not detract from the ingenuity of the idea.

It was lovely to see so many of you on Merton Field this afternoon to celebrate the Coronation. Many people were dressed in red white and blue hats and bow ties, carrying red white and blue umbrellas. I managed to find myself a Union Jack apron which caused a degree of comment. I was asked whether I was busy serving Coronation Quiche to the multitudes - and was told that I looked "Stunning!" I suspect there was a degree of irony in the latter comment. Our brass and string groups performed magnificently and Pre-Prep paraded the beautiful crowns they had made. We gave all the pupils a commemorative coin and I hope that they will keep them for many years to come. I have been told by a number of people, older than myself, about the late Queen's Coronation and their memories of that event. I wonder if our pupils will remember this Coronation 70 years hence.

I spoke to the assembled gathering about the fact that two Christ Church Cathedral School Old Boys are featured in the Coronation service. Roderick Williams, the well-known baritone and former Old Boy of the School, is singing early on and has composed some music which will be performed during the ceremony. Roderick is an exceptional singer and I am certain that this will become apparent tomorrow in the Abbey. The final piece of music of the service, before the National Anthem, is the glorious Te Deum by William Walton, one of our most famous Old Boys, after whom our Walton Hall is named. We should all be proud that pupils from our small school have composed two of the pieces of music that are to be performed on this historic occasion.

I very much hope that you all have a wonderful weekend and that you are able to watch the Coronation - maybe even by going to London to join the expectant crowd. May I suggest wearing a Union Jack apron? You too could be deemed "Stunning!"

Arlan sang 'Laudamus te' as part of Vivaldi's Gloria, alongside ex-Worcester chorister Ivan (who now holds a Music Scholarship at MCS). Many boys have given up break times to teach music to their friends; a valuable opportunity to look at the technical demands of their instrument as a teacher rather than as a pupil (and often extremely entertaining).


