

Christ Church Cathedral School

Dear Parents,

I hope that many of you enjoyed watching the Coronation last Saturday. I am certain that, amongst all the glorious music and pageantry, you noticed the King's first words spoken in the Abbey in response to the chorister who addressed him. He said: "I come not to be served, but to serve." These are words of profound importance, I believe, and should be a model for all our lives.

On Sunday, a number of our pupils and staff will be taking this message to heart, running in the Oxford Parks Run. In terms of staff, the dynamic crew consists of Miss Farmer, Mrs Green, Mme Loyer and Mrs Merriman. They will be starting at 10 o'clock and running the necessary 10km in support of the charity Muscular Dystrophy UK. My participation in the race will be as a spectator and I hope that I might bump into some of you.

As I mentioned last week, I spent the early part of this week at Worcester at the Choir Schools' Association Annual Conference. We discussed many things which are relevant to schools with choirs, and heard a most inspiring talk from the Bishop of Worcester, the Rt Revd Dr John Inge, someone who played a role in the Coronation as Lord High Almoner, the person who arranges the Monarch's giving of alms or charity in the form of the ancient ceremony of the distribution of the Maundy money. The Bishop reminded us all about the preciousness of the tradition of English choral music, which is partly sustained by the existence of schools such as CCCS. This tradition means that Britain has the finest set of choirs in the world, something which was gloriously on show at the Coronation. Outside of Britain there are very few schools of this nature, there is one in the USA - in New York - and only two in the entire Southern Hemisphere, one of those being in Christ Church, New Zealand, founded of course by members of Christ Church, Oxford. In Britain there are over 50 such schools. Dr Inge encouraged us to do all we could to promote choral singing. We will, of course, take his advice to heart. More on this soon!

The catering at the conference was organised by our caterers, Thomas Franks, who also provide the catering for the King's School, Worcester, our hosts. The Founder and CEO of the business, Frank Bothwell, was there. Mr Bothwell is a remarkable and inspirational man who not only runs an extraordinarily successful business, providing excellent food to many schools such as ours, but is dedicated to serving others. It was Mr Bothwell who came to CCCS on Christmas Day when our choristers were here singing the services, and who used our kitchens to prepare food to take to those in Oxford who would not have been able to enjoy a Christmas dinner. It was a privilege that we could make our facilities available for this purpose.

Our 1st Team played The Dragon at Cricket on Wednesday; I am delighted to tell you that we won convincingly! What was particularly impressive, I thought, was that our Head Boy, Jeremy Newman, and our Head of Sport, Thomas Bratby, both decided not to bowl (they are both outstanding bowlers) so that everybody else would get a chance to bowl. I thought this was an extremely mature approach to the game and another example of people thinking about others.

Part of my job is, of course, to visit and form relationships with senior schools. On a recent trip to one of the schools that we send a good number of pupils to, I was delighted to be told that they always liked the characters of boys from CCCS and they rated them very highly in terms of their contribution to the life of the school. We are very fortunate in our close relationships with senior schools. I hope that as many of you as possible will be able to come to Cathedral Assembly next Friday to meet Mr and Mrs Roberts. Mr Roberts will be preaching at the service. He is Headmaster of Ampleforth College, in Yorkshire. In his time he has been Master of the Scholars at Winchester College, Headmaster of Bradfield College and Headmaster of the oldest school in the world, The King's School, Canterbury.

More than ever, our school is full of the sound of music as the boys prepare for the House Music Competition next Friday. By the sounds of what I have heard, we are in for a feast. Please make sure that you come – the Music Competition is one of the year's greatest treats!

Have a wonderful weekend and, unlike in the last couple of weeks, I look forward to seeing you on Monday!
