Dear Parents,

If we shadows have offended, Think but this, and all is mended, That you have but slumber'd here While these visions did appear. And this weak and idle theme, No more yielding but a dream, Gentles, do not reprehend:

Last Monday evening, many of us heard these words as we sat on Merton Field at the edge of the Woodland School. They are part of Puck's epilogue which ends Shakespeare's glorious and magical play, "A Midsummer Night's Dream." Puck, now speaking directly to us, the audience, begs that if we have not enjoyed the performance we can imagine that we have been asleep and that the whole thing was only a dream. Never have such superfluous words ever been spoken. All of us who attended the performance of A Midsummer Night's Dream, loved it. The setting could not have been more perfect. In a city which sees many outdoor performances of Shakespeare at this time of year, there could not have been a more perfect scene – indeed the only sound which interrupted the speech were the bells of Merton Tower chiming the hour. At this particular spot there is a half-moon extension of the field which juts into the wood. This was the stage. The actors were able to enter the stage from behind the trees and bushes of the wood, disappearing in one direction and then magically reappearing from another. Once on stage, the boys performed with great colour and panache, acting with the bravura and confidence of professionals. The performance was, in every way, charming and magical. I am so proud of our boys who performed so well and I want to thank Ms Skipwith and Mrs Fairhurst for their immensely hard work in giving us something to dream about.

I have just come back from the Art Exhibition which Mrs Elias has mounted in the Walton Hall. Much of the art is work that has been created by pupils during the course of the year and I was very struck by the vivid colours and the care for detail. Much of the work though has been done in the last two days. Mrs Elias invited a professional artist, Gino Ballantyne, to work with the pupils. The idea was for each Form to choose a piece of music which they would then react to artistically. Some of the responses were extraordinary and it was a delight talking to many of the boys about why they had reacted in the way that they did. The exhibition will be open for the next few days so I would thoroughly recommend a visit.

Outside the exhibition, alongside some delicious refreshments, Mr Wang had very kindly agreed to host a tea tasting. He had a beautiful box, out of which he selected the most exquisite teas, all carefully compacted into flat cakes. They all varied in colour, some dark some green with hints of colour, like meadow flowers, some white. These were placed carefully in ceramic pots, designed so that the tea might breathe. Many of us were transfixed by the delicacy of the flavours and the care and ceremony with which the teas were served. It was a lovely way to end the week.

Not though that this week is ending on Friday afternoon. Very happily we have Sports Day tomorrow, which will take place on Merton Field. Excitement has been rising over the past few days. From my desk, I heard the following remark: "Guess what? It's 41 hours until Sports Day starts." Many of our pupils have a real eye for detail! It will be so lovely to see the whole school community together on a day which promises to be appropriately sunny. Sports Day will be followed by the Old Boys' Cricket Match. Many of our current Form 8s will be taking part. Please don't feel in a rush, therefore, to leave early after Sports Day - given that the match will provide a worthy context for the picnics.

It is always difficult to anticipate what conversations one might become involved with at lunch. Nonetheless I most certainly wasn't expecting the question which I was asked as I sat down on Thursday. "Sir! I'm very keen to ask you. Should you wear Black Tie or White Tie to the opera?" I have to say that this is a matter upon which I don't have a very fixed opinion!

Earlier this term, CCCS was one of 4,400 schools which took part in a nationwide competition for Mathematics aimed at Years 7 and 8. It is called the Junior Mathematical Challenge and it allows boys in this school to see how their Maths ability compares with pupils in the rest of the country.

During an Assembly of the School this week the JMC Award Certificates were presented by the Headmaster and Mr Bagnall, Head of Maths, to all the award winners.

The following boys achieved a Bronze Certificate. A Bronze Certificate is awarded to those pupils who achieved in the top 40% in the country.


