Dear Parents,

It was a great pleasure to see Nursery and Pre-Prep in the Cathedral this morning. There is something very special about having the whole school together in one place. I take it for granted that boys and girls as young as three can sit through a Cathedral service without causing a major disturbance – but, when one thinks about it, it is quite a remarkable achievement. I strongly believe that if you have high expectations of children, they will achieve them. In our case, we expect pupils to be able to sit still and listen in places such as cathedrals. I think this ability is perhaps more important than we realise. Without the ability to concentrate, there is very little that someone can achieve, particularly anything which requires careful thought or intricate distinction. So much human advance and development is based on the ability to think carefully about things and the earlier one is able to do this the better. It being Michaelmas day today, I spoke about St Michael and his defeating of the dragon. I was talking about this story when I noticed one boy's eyes increase dramatically in size. He then seized the hand of the teacher sitting next to him. As he said to me later, "Mr Murray - your story about the Dragon was SCARY!" Fortunately, another boy revealed to everyone very soon afterwards that dragons don't actually exist. There was a palpable sense of relief. I'm so pleased that we managed to clear that point up! There's enough to be concerned about without having to worry about the odd dragon!

This year, we have decided to take each year group in the Prep School out of school for a team building exercise. Every member of staff who has taken a trip has remarked upon how important this has been and how much it has contributed to the new boys fitting in to their year groups. I have been particularly struck by how quickly our new pupils have settled in and how happy they all seem to be.

I was delighted to be able to appoint a number of boys to important positions of responsibility this morning. At this time of year our Form 8s have to step up and help the staff to ensure that the school runs smoothly. We ask staff to observe how the boys perform and, combined with what we already know about them, we choose who will be the officers. (see the announcement and photograph on Page 6). It is one of the most important qualities of a prep school that it provides an opportunity for its senior pupils to take responsibility in their final year. The effect of this is profound. Rather than being the most junior pupils in a large school, they become young adults, who importantly contribute to the atmosphere and character of the place and it is unsurprising that boys who have been to schools such as ours, have a maturity about them which many of their contemporaries do not enjoy. Very many congratulations to these boys and to all of the Form 8s who have supported them by creating such a positive atmosphere in their year group.

We are, once again, running Bikeability courses for our pupils this term. Within a very short while of advertising the course, the places were taken up. This is hugely encouraging. Happily, more and more pupils are travelling to and from school by bike. The advantage of this time-honoured way of getting around in Oxford goes without saying and I would encourage parents to consider bringing pupils to school by bike if they possibly can, especially given that the Botley Road will now not open again until October next year, according to the Council. I was amused to hear one of the Pre-Prep boys say with great excitement yesterday: "Look there's Mr Mirko. He drives the Botley Bus." (it's wonderful that even our youngest pupils appreciate the power of alliteration!) Indeed, our bus from North Oxford which now calls at Frideswide Square to collect children from the other side of the railway bridge, is very well used. Do get in touch with the office if you wish your child to join us on the "Botley Bus!"

In school, we are preparing for an extremely exciting concert coming up next month. The Antigua and Barbuda Youth Symphony Orchestra (ABYSO) will be performing in the Cathedral alongside a choir drawn from boys in the Prep School Established five years ago under

Established five years ago under the guidance of the Kanneh-Mason family, the ABYSO has opened up exciting new opportunities for orchestral playing in Antigua, and it's intended that it will become a hub for classical music across the Caribbean. Some parents may remember my work for this scheme last year, and I am very moved that CCCS musicians will be able to share a performance with the ABYSO during its very first trip abroad.

The concert will take place in the Cathedral at **12.00 noon on 16th October**, and will last just under an hour. Parents are very welcome to attend, and I hope that this will prove a fantastic event for all involved. The programme includes a jazz waltz by Shostakovich, a selection of songs popular in Antigua, and an innovative version of *Winter*, from Vivaldi's 'Four Seasons' arranged for orchestra and steel pan.

Languages Day



Since the competition was first launched in 2011 by Chris Evans on the Radio 2 Breakfast Show, it has received over one million stories from children throughout the UK.

This year, the two age categories will be 5 - 7 year-olds and 8 - 11 year-olds.

Children of all abilities are encouraged to use their creativity and imagination to write a story they would love to read without the pressure of having to worry about spelling, punctuation and grammar.

All boys will be discussing what makes a good story in their English lessons over the next few weeks and will then write their 500 words story, either in lesson time or for prep. The school will then post off the boys' entries to the BBC.
