

Christ Church Cathedral School

Dear Parents,

I very much hope that as many of you as possible will come to our joint concert with the Antigua and Barbuda Youth Symphony Orchestra in the Cathedral on Monday at 12.00 noon. The word 'unmissable' is almost certainly overused but I am completely convinced that I would be justified in describing this concert as an "unmissable event." The ABYSO has been transforming participation in classical music in the Caribbean since its foundation five years ago. Our Director of Music, Ms Biddell, is a mentor for the orchestra, and a relationship has developed between the musicians of CCCS and Antigua. Several members of our music team now support the ABYSO's work, and longstanding parents may remember a visit to Christ Church by Antigua's National Youth Choir in 2019.

At Monday's concert, members of the Cathedral Choir and those from Worcester and Pembroke will sing together alongside the ABYSO. The concert will also feature solo items performed by William Kirkman (one of our Form 8 Cathedral Choristers), Jess Mogridge (CCCS Oboe teacher), as well as a duo performed by two members of the world-famous Kanneh-Mason family, Braimah and Konya. Another two members of this family will also be playing in the orchestra.

The event will be attended by The High Commissioner for Antigua, Her Excellency Karen-Mae Hill, and by the Governor General himself, His Excellency Sir Rodney Williams. It is a huge honour for us to be hosting such a high profile event and it would be so exciting if it could be well-supported by the whole school community. I was delighted upon my return to school from being away last week to find the walls of the Walton Centre covered in poems. These were works chosen by the boys and staff of the School, following our celebration of National Poetry Day. I was so thrilled to see the variety of choices and, on some, there were comments about why those poems had been chosen, many of which were very insightful. I have just come back from looking at them again and found some boys fascinated by who had chosen what. One Form 4 boy had chosen "I vow to thee my country." His comment to me about it was one that, to my mind, showed a great deal more sophistication than some of the adult responses that I have heard expressed about the work. He said: "It looks as though it's going to be about war but then you realise it's not really about war at all; it's about looking to make the world a better place." Quite! How perceptive and thoughtful our pupils are. I think the world would be a better place if people read more poetry.

This theme was continued in the Cathedral this morning when we were visited by James Kazi, the Under Master of Westminster School. A school which, as he pointed out, had a very close historical link to Christ Church because Henry VIII was involved with the foundation of both institutions. The reading Mr Kazi had chosen was from the Sermon on the Mount and he talked to us about the importance of kindness and of treating others well. Few words have played such an important part in the development of humanity and it was wonderful to hear them beautifully read by a Form 8 pupil, and then so movingly preached upon by Mr Kazi. As I said in the Cathedral, Westminster sent a higher proportion of boys to Oxford and Cambridge last year than any other school in the country and so Mr Kazi is very used to teaching outstandingly able pupils. He was very impressed with the pupils he met here at CCCS – huge praise indeed.

Returning to poetry again, by the time you have read this, there will be more poetry on the walls of the Walton Centre, this time poetry written by our boys as responses to the topic selected for National Poetry Day this year, namely 'Refuge.' I look forward so much to reading these poems and I hope that you will find time to come and see what your sons have written.

Much of what I have written this week is about words and their power – we should never underestimate this. As the great poet George Herbert, who was a pupil at Westminster, said: "Good words are worth much and cost little."

We are holding our Open Morning tomorrow. Many people are coming round to look at the School and I want to thank the large number of you who have kindly arranged for your sons to come and help us on the day. In any of the surveys we do, or whenever we talk to people about how they have heard of our school, they say personal recommendation. Thank you so much, therefore, for all the lovely things you have said about the School to people who have then become CCCS families; your words, even if they cost little, are worth so much.

This week, Pre-Prep enjoyed a much anticipated visit from the local Neighbourhood Policing Team. The boys assembled in Walton Hall, and a deafening hush of awe and wonder spread through their ranks as the Police entered the room, decked out in full uniform and carrying with them all manner of exciting equipment.

Sergeant Peter Neale introduced himself and his team, and as an opening gambit, asked our boys what they thought the job of the police was. Many of the responses inevitably revolved around the theme of 'catching the bad guys', 'locking up criminals' and 'putting robbers in handcuffs', but the police team explained to our boys that whilst that is a part of their job, they do lots of other things as well. One vital message was that they wanted people to see them as approachable, so that they are able to help in lots of ways across the community and to ensure that everyone is safe and supported, children included.

There then followed a dynamic and fun demonstration of how their uniform and equipment worked, and with the help of lots of very eager volunteers, they role-played common policing scenarios. We were lucky enough to try on all the different uniform items and hats, and the boys learnt about different ranks and responsibilities.

A highlight for our boys was dressing up in riot shields and helmets, and staving off paper missile attacks from the police! However, perhaps the most magical moment of all was when we used a live police radio to contact all of the police officers on the beat around the city. We should a wholehearted 'Hello Oxford!', and back across the radio crackled a chorus of friendly 'hello, hello, hellos'...

It was a truly unforgettable experience for our Pre-Prep boys and a wonderful chance to learn all about bona fide 'Everyday Heroes' within CCCS' local community. TR
