

Christ Church Cathedral School

Friday 10th November 2023

Dear Parents,

It was a great honour to have been visited today in the Cathedral by the Bishop of Worcester, The Right Revd John Inge. He appeared resplendent in his episcopal robes and came in wearing his mitre, that traditional symbol of a Bishop. The first Bishop of Worcester was consecrated in 680AD, a timescale which makes our 500 year history seem like the blink of an eye. Bishop John told us that he was the 113th Bishop of Worcester – a staggering thought. He brought with him a visual aid, hidden at first under his mitre, which the boys had to guess. It turned out to be a small log. Bishop John explained that the lines on the surface of the log told the story of the log's growth, just as knowing Jesus told us about the loving nature of God, a very vivid way of making a point which is at the centre of Christianity.

Bishop John is the Lord High Almoner, a position which goes back to the 13th Century. The holder's role is to support the Sovereign in their distribution of the Maundy Money every year, a symbol of charitable giving which the Sovereign has always undertaken on Maundy Thursday at one of the English cathedrals. When I asked Bishop John whether he had ever been to Christ Church Cathedral before, he mentioned the visit he had made with the Late Queen in 2013 to distribute the Maundy Money. This was shortly before I came to the School but many of the children remembered the Queen's visit. In many ways that was a different era.



Last Friday afternoon, as I mentioned, I heard about a pilgrimage to Mount Athos that one of our pupils had made. Today I was visited by another father and son who wanted to share a tea drinking ceremony with me. It was a very moving experience. I wrote about the drinking of tea a few months ago after we had been treated to tea at our Art Exhibition. But this time I learned a great deal more. Everything was done with such care and tenderness, all the equipment being laid out beautifully. What became apparent was that the ceremony was much more than merely drinking tea. I was fascinated by the way in which the tea was

thought of as something alive which had a personality. We drank three teas, each one very different. We watched carefully as the tea woke up, becoming more aromatic and the very leaves changed their shapes as the ceremony continued. By the end, I had no difficulty in understanding the power of the Tea Ceremony and understood why the tea was talked about as if it were alive. I asked whether anyone in China drank coffee - a naive question. Apparently, there are Starbucks all over the place, where harassed people down vast cups of coffee in the same way that we do when rushing to work. But tea is clearly the superior drink. Interestingly I was told that tea is now pretty expensive in China, where it is so highly regarded. This reminded me of the way things must have been in 18th Century England where tea was of such value that it was often kept in special locked containers. This was another unforgettable end to my week.

This morning we held our Remembrance Ceremony in the playground. The whole school stood still as we waited for the right time to begin, it being important that the two minutes' silence happened at precisely 11.00. When the silence itself came it was deeply moving as we heard Great Tom (the vast mediaeval bell in Tom Tower) tolling out across the City, marking the hour when the guns fell silent at the end of WWI. I am always impressed by the way in which our pupils have the ability to understand the importance of such solemn occasions. All societies need to have such moments of serious contemplation.

We have been focussing on table manners this week and Mr Harrison gave a talk to the Prep School on various dos and don'ts. He showed a video of the correct way to use a knife and fork, both the American way and the European way. Particularly, we have been asking boys to ask if they can leave the table and to ask their friends to pass things rather than to stretch across the table. If you feel happy to do so, please reinforce these manners at home. That way they will become habitual, as manners ought to be.

I had a wonderful break time. At the beginning of it, I received a huge chocolate cup cake as it was a boy's birthday. Perhaps I have got to the stage when I shouldn't accept such offers; however, I did so with great pleasure. It was just as I had finished the cake that another boy came up to me and offered me a present for Divali. "What is it?" I asked, innocently. "A chocolate," was the response. As a child I had always lived by the old English proverb, "Never look a gift horse in the mouth." I was certainly not going to change my approach at this late stage! I accepted without even a show of restraint! May I wish all those who are going to celebrate Divali this weekend all the very best.




To help with this year's event we kindly ask for donations from parents. If you can give any of the following, please get in touch:


