

Christ Church Cathedral School

Dear Parents,

I thought this was a school for humans only. Following the performance of the Forms 3 and 4 play, I am seriously questioning my assumption. On the stage were all manner of creatures. There were pigs in military fatigues, heralds in full mediaeval costume, a terrifying wolf who strutted through the audience frightening them with his harrowing roar; there was a grandmother complete with elaborate hair do, there were strange creatures of the wood and, of course, a young girl with a red riding hood, skipping through the forest accompanied by her dog. And that's just scratching the surface. Clearly we are a much more complex school than I at first thought. I was so thrilled with the commitment which everyone on the stage had, to ensure that the performance was as authentic as possible. We went through the whole spectrum of emotions, tragedy at the death of an innocent grandmother, relief that Red Riding Hood happened to have a revolver on her with which she was able to eradicate the wolf's attempt to eat her, and on and on it goes. One mother told me that so focussed was her son on ensuring that his portrayal of the dog was life-like, he had been studying the habits of his pet dog - so that his performance on stage was perfect. The whole experience was delightful and I would like to thank all those who were involved, especially, of course, Mrs Green, Mrs Fairhurst and Mrs Fletcher, on the acting side, and Miss Biddell on the music. Two Form 8 boys, Isaac and Thomas, were brilliant too in terms of the lighting and sound effects.

I went on a visit to Our Lady's School in Abingdon yesterday which was a great pleasure in that I was greeted so warmly by a large number of our past pupils, all of whom seemed to be very happy there. On the way back, I decided to walk to school from where I had parked my car, via the Meadow. Half way up the Long Walk I encountered a group of pupils wearing a familiar uniform – it was Nursery and some of Pre-Prep who were out for a walk. In the Long Walk, a tree was being cut down and the tree surgeon came and talked to the children about what he was doing. Our pupils are so lucky to have the Meadow at hand, a place in the middle of the City where they can learn about the natural world, see cattle grazing on water meadows, and all within spitting distance of their school. And then there are the vistas of some of the most extraordinary buildings in Europe – well that's another story. Certainly our boys and girls seemed extremely happy to be out and about.

In the Cathedral this morning, Alexander in Form 4 played a charming piano piece by Debussy entitled 'Doctor Gradus ad Parnassum'. Alexander played with real aplomb and spirit as well as playing with extraordinary accuracy for someone of his age. Sometimes one really does have to pinch oneself about the quality of music we hear at this school. Friday after Friday, external speakers marvel at the quality of the music that our young pupils perform. There is no doubt that children can do extraordinary things if they live in an environment which is both supportive and where expectations are high. I think the most striking thing is that behind these achievements is a world where playing musical instruments is just the most natural thing conceivable – and of course it is! Hence why, on any day, music can be heard coming from somewhere in the school.

And what a joy it was to have been in Pembroke and Worcester College Chapels this week to hear so many boys singing at services. We read about the fact that there is a decline in boys wishing to be in choirs. Here the opposite is the case – our numbers really are growing. There is so much to be positive about.

This week, our Making the Most of Oxford club visited the other side of the playground wall, namely the Jesuit College, Campion Hall. The building was designed by the great 20th Century architect, Edwin Lutyens, designer of the Capitol buildings in New Delhi and the Cenotaph in Whitehall. As much as anything it is fascinating to see what lies behind the wall against which footballs are kicked. There are a huge number of treasures of real interest. One such treasure is the desk upon which Napoleon signed his abdication, which the boys were shown. I imagine there are very few people who are able to see such a historically significant object, particularly at a time when Napoleon must be very much in vogue given the release of the most recent film!

I can sense a feeling of excitement gathering – the pupils are beginning to warm up as Advent Sunday and then Christmas gets ever closer. What a wonderful time of year it is and indeed what is the answer to that question which everyone seems to be asking "Where has November gone?" Just wait until we get to December...

Lost Property




There is a large Lost Property Box in the Foyer, outside the Walton Hall.


To help with this year's event we kindly ask for donations from parents. If you can give any of the following, please get in touch:
