Dear Parents,

All those who attended the Informal Christmas Concert on Wednesday enjoyed a real treat. There has been a number of boys who have been ill recently so the printed programme was very definitely not what actually occurred on the day. There was nothing to be disappointed about though. Of course, we very much missed hearing many of our excellent pupils perform but others leapt into the breach. We were all so impressed by the way in which they did so and it brought home to me the way in which musical performance is just something completely natural to our pupils. They just love performing and seem never to be phased by having to do so. It's almost as normal as breathing.

There were, of course, some exquisite solo performances but what struck me most were the groups who performed; they all seemed to play so well together, feeding off one another's musicality and spirit. One of the groups was a double reed ensemble. This may sound quite an ordinary thing but really it is not. Double reed instruments are, apparently, rare as they are very difficult to play. To have a double reed ensemble in a school is unusual and to have one in a prep school, more unusual still. But to have one with eight players, a virtual miracle. Magic was definitely on show.

We then watched a string group play an 18th Century piece of music as it had never been played before – without a number of its parts – given the number of boys away. But it nonetheless sounded tremendous – we were able to hear all the parts on offer and there was no lack of complexity. One really did have to pinch oneself to remember the ages of the performers.

And then this morning, everyone in the Cathedral was enchanted by the Christingle Service, delightfully presented by Pre-Prep. Just as the beautifully crafted Christingles were being lit, the lights dimmed and the Cathedral was plunged into near darkness. The candlelight, suddenly alive in the darkness, danced over the expectant faces of the pupils who then burst into song. They sang two songs about light: 'Big Star' and perhaps even more appropriately, 'This Little Light of Mine!' and shine those lights most certainly did!

This afternoon, all around the School, the pupils were preparing for another light show – that which is to be held next Friday when we hope that all parents will come after dark to see a number of Christmas Trees beautifully decorated. Having seen what each class has been preparing, I think it's going to be a charming occasion. There will also be food and entertainment on offer as well as a raffle for all the hampers which you have been so generously donating. Do please make sure that the event is in your diary.

I often mention singing in my letters but I hope you will excuse me for doing so again. Our three choirs are all very popular at the moment and on Sunday all three of our College Chapels held Carol Services. Again, there was something in common – they were all full, completely full. The stewards in the Cathedral told me that there were almost 1000 people in the building while in Worcester Chapel there were certainly more than 100 and in Pembroke not many fewer. In the Cathedral and in Pembroke the services were live-streamed, allowing yet more people to enjoy them. Our choristers are providing a very significant service to the people and colleges of Oxford and we should not underestimate the effect they have on so many. This reminded me of the occasion when an elderly lady stopped me one day and said "Would you give this advent calendar to your choristers." I thanked her and asked her why she wished me to pass it on. She said: "I want them to know how much they mean to so many people in this city." It is easy to forget what an important role our choristers play.

As we approach Christmas, it has felt a bit more like Lapland here in Oxford recently. I went over to the playing fields on Wednesday to see the matches being played against New College. It was very fortunate that the boys played with such vigour otherwise they would have been frozen to the spot. As it was they all looked well heated as they ran with such energy. There were six matches some which went our way, some which didn't but this Headmaster was particularly pleased that our A Team won 4 - 1. It's probably not entirely fair to say we were four times better but, well...

This Sunday is Advent Sunday, the beginning of the Church year. The collect for Advent Sunday begins as follows: "Almighty God, Give us the grace to cast away the works of darkness and put upon us the armour of light." May your weekend be full of light at this time of short days and long nights.

Wednesday afternoon saw Forms 7 and 8 boys head over to New College for our first whole year group Football fixture of the season. Our A team match was a hotly contested affair from the first whistle, with New College taking the lead, against the run of play after 15 minutes.
