

# **Christ Church Cathedral School**

#### Dear Parents,

I was speaking to an English Tutor at one of the Oxford Colleges recently who said that applicants for English Literature had declined over the past few years. Even more strikingly though, she said that over the past ten years, the number of boys applying to read English had collapsed and that almost all applicants for the subject were now girls. Being able to read and appreciate literature has always been something of the profoundest importance for the mind and the soul and, at CCCS, we will continue to ensure that our boys are nourished with the fruits of literature. This is particularly important in England where literature has been the dominant artistic force since mediaeval times. In 1904 Oscar Schmitz, a German commentator, called England the "Land ohne musik" i.e. the country without music, very different indeed from his native Germany which is so rightly feted for its composers. Instead, England was a land of books and words. For a generation of boys to turn its face against such wealth seems to me to be tragic.

At CCCS, of course, nothing could be further from the truth. Boys are reading with great enthusiasm and indeed, suggestions for good Christmas reads, made by the boys, are now festooned over the walls of the Walton Centre. Ms Skipwith has organised the challenge and I hope that you will all support her and the School in encouraging reading over the holidays when the dark and cold nights will provide time to settle down by the fire or a radiator and travel into the world of a book.

My lunchtimes this week have been particularly intense. I began discussing the virtues of various political systems with a group of boys, and this seems to have gone on throughout the week. We have discussed all manner of political systems and their merits and weaknesses, and the interest with which this process has been engaged in has been very exciting. It is thrilling to be working in an environment where boys genuinely care about such matters – after all they are the future. Today it was about the Oxford Green Belt and the cost of local housing. Just wait until this lot can become MPs!

On Wednesday morning, I went to see our Nursery and Reception Nativity Play. It was tremendous – the boys and girls fully entering into the world of the stable. The focus was intense and the songs that were sung as an accompaniment to the miraculous events were very touching. I am always struck by the way in which young children learn the art of commanding attention on a stage if properly encouraged and nurtured, and it was clearly the case in this instance.

Form 8 performed their French Play this morning after having rehearsed it for a total of ten hours. The Play was based on Victor Hugo's Les Misérables, that favourite of West End musicals. The difference was that this one was in French. Our pupils spoke so fluently and with such convincing accents. I was swept up into the world of 19th Century France and even found myself wishing I could taste the brilliantly described cassoulet! Quel triomphe!

Both Worcester and Pembroke Choirs have had very successful terms, as I mentioned recently, and we will be delighted to hear them sing at the Carol Service next Saturday morning. In the meantime, the Cathedral Choir, far from winding down, enters its most busy phase. On Monday, the Choristers sang in St Mary's Church, Great Milton, to a large crowd who where the guests of famous chef Raymond Blanc, who had invited them to his world-famous restaurant, Le Manoir. Between courses, the whole party decamped to the candlelit church and listened to a concert of carols sung by the Choir, and to readings partly read by M Blanc himself, full of Gallic passion and warm Christmas spirit. It was, according to Mr Robson, an intoxicating experience despite the fact that at times the lighting was so atmospheric that the Choir had to sing in near darkness. Fortunately they knew the music well enough to handle such a yuletide emergency. The Choir will be singing at a number of services over the Christmas period, including, at 11.00 am on Christmas Day. 

These were three of the most famous of the 280-plus Protestants burned during Mary Tudor's merciless assertion of Catholicism. We were allowed into Balliol to see the old

doors, charred by the burnings; and we also visited the chapel, designed by William Butterfield, architect of Keble. NR
