Dear Parents,

Every week I hold a meeting with the Head Boy and Deputy Head Boy. Today we were talking about table manners. The Head Boy said, with great enthusiasm, that table manners in the Dining Room were much better – as he put it: "We've got table manners nailed!" I am delighted that manners in the school are so good. Indeed only yesterday, I sat with a group of boys who could not have been more charming. I was offered a glass of water, another boy asked me politely if I could pass a knife and fork from a place he could have easily leaned over to, and all the boys there asked me if they could leave the table, after they had finished their lunches. From my point of view, these are all signs of thoughtfulness and of a caring attitude towards others. I have almost certainly mentioned before how much I like Winchester's motto, "Manners Makyth Man" What a wonderful definition of what it is to be a man – and given that it won't be long before some of our boys are men, having manners nailed is a very positive thing!

Perhaps some of you read the Spectator, a wonderful magazine which is Britain's oldest regular magazine, having been established in 1818. The articles are beautifully written and the regular columns very entertaining. Over the past few years, two of our recent parents, Wolfgang Munchau and Owen Matthews have written for the Spectator, Wolfgang on Economics and Owen on Russian affairs. One of the columns (in this case not written by a former parent) is called "Dear Mary" in which readers write in to ask advice about tricky social problems or matters of etiquette – all very tongue in cheek. This evening I felt as if I was Mary when a boy came up to me, stared rather intensely and addressed me: "Sir may I ask your advice?" "Of course," I responded, "What would you say if you found yourself talking to the parent of a friend? How would you ensure that conversation flowed?" How delightful that our pupils are concerned about such matters. I gave the enquirer some advice, which I thought was reasonable and so I hope if any of you are addressed by your son's friends, you will have a fluent and entertaining conversation... As with manners, the ability to communicate in a civilized way is essential for future flourishing.

I went to the playing fields on Wednesday to watch Forms 5 and 6 play against The Dragon. Success was not universal, but neither was defeat and some teams performed tremendously. The aspect of the afternoon which impressed me most though, was the fact that every single boy in Forms 5 and 6 turned up to play. I don't know of any other school where every pupil would be involved. I very much hope that as many of you as possible will take the opportunity to come and support our fixtures.

We heard today that Will S has obtained a Music Scholarship at Dean Close in Cheltenham. He was the fourth Cathedral Chorister out of four this year to have achieved a Music Scholarship. This in itself is impressive, but it is even more so if one realises that for the last ten years, every single Cathedral Chorister has achieved a music award at a senior school. Such a record is extraordinary. Being a Cathedral Chorister here at Christ Church does give you a more than excellent chance of gaining an award in a senior school. Well done indeed to Martin, Will, William and Jonathon.

The waters have again risen around Oxford and much of the Meadow is now flooded again – our playing fields being an island of green sward surrounded by water. The beauty of the place in all it's different guises takes one's breath away. I hope I never get used to the Meadow - or to consider it mundane.

When on duty on the playground yesterday, I was standing in the middle of the playground sheltering under my umbrella. We were ignoring the drizzle and refusing to declare a wet break. A crowd of pupils came up to me. "Sir who's on duty? We can't see a member of staff anywhere." I tend to think of our pupils as observant but on this occasion... I count myself lucky that I have a reasonably intact sense of self!


